Deer Feeders

Do not place deer feeders within 80 yards of residence.



Human-Bear Conflict

Contact appropriate ODWC personnel or the local Sheriff's office immediately.

An Oklahoma black bear diet consists of:

80% vegetable/fruit

15% insect

5% small animal, reptiles and eggs



Food Attractants


Common attractants involved in human-bear conflicts include deer corn feeders, pet food, livestock food, birdseed feeders, hummingbird feeders, unsecured garbage, chickens and other small livestock, bee hives/apiaries.

2009 was the first year that Oklahoma had an open bear season

Oklahoma Bear Hunting Counties

Bear hunting during open seasons is allowed in portions of southeastern counties located east of US Highway 69 and south of Interstate 40. These counties include:

Atoka Bryan Choctaw Haskell Latimer LeFlore McCurtain McIntosh Muskogee Pittsburg Pushmataha Sequoyah

When/Where are Human-Bear Conflicts Most Likely to Occur?

May is typically when bear reports begin coming in.
These reports are weighted toward yearling, male bears that have just been kicked away from their mom and are trying to avoid mature males, find their own home range and keep their bellies full too.

June & July may see a small drop in the number of calls because natural soft mast like blueberries & blackberries are becoming abundant.

August is typically a high month for reports as soft mast sources diminish and grasses and other vegetation dry out or become unpalatable.
