- Warden Murray submitted some cell phone warrants for a deer poaching case in Cleveland County and is patiently awaiting a judge's signature. He also secured a conviction on an Oklahoma County waterfowl baiting case.
- WardensMurray & Buley did a fishing program for Jones Elementary School.
- Wardens Meskimen, Hanson & Lt. Strang taught a STEP program in McClain County.
- The whole district has been actively involved in the Game Warden Academy teaching numerous topics or being Role Players for: physical fitness training, search warrants, wildlife search & seizure, precision driving, night driving, inland boat operations & marine patrol fundamentals, defensive tactics, wildlife forensics, & the waterboarding class known as Officer Water Survival. On the last day of defensive tactics, Wardens Mesis, Campbell, France, Buley, Harriet & Lt. Strang volunteered to be bag holders and being on the receiving end of knee strike takedowns to handcuffing from the Prospective New Game Wardens after the PGWs received a generous dose of OC spray affectionately applied by Capt Emmons, Lt. Young & GWs Branch & Loudermilk.
- Wardens Meskimen & Harriet both made separate cases on Asian Marijuana growers taking wildlife illegally. Warden Meskimen interviewed a guy in February who had shot several Robins with a .22 rifle from his vehicle on a county road for stir fry. Despite the language barrier, the suspect really wanted to hunt some birds similar to robins and was very excited to learn he could shoot (and eat) all the crows he wanted. Warden Harriet's interview didn't go as well do to his lack of fluency in Mandarin Chinese. His suspect had shot a wild turkey in his yard in an Edmond suburb in Logan County with a .22 rifle. But thru Google talk, phone calls with Mandarin speakers and the RP who had a video of the suspect washing his vehicle with the dead turkey beside him, Warden Harriet was able to make a case.

#### Dist. 6 - Capt. Mark Walker

- Highlights All D6 wardens attended our annual 3 day training event where we completed our annual CLEET training requirements. This included Waterfowl Enforcement Techniques, Deceptive Behaviors, Firearms training, Sexual Assault Training, Missing Persons training and Mental Health training. This 3 day get together not only allows us to complete our annual training requirements during a relatively slow time of the year for game wardens, but also give us a chance to spend time together in the evenings building camaraderie and getting to catch up with each other regarding our busy lives outside of our work lives. We were joined by some 8th district wardens for some of the training and enjoyed having them.
- Supervisors have been working on completing annual HRDS training requirements as well as completing annual inventory audits and starting 2025 performance evaluations for those that they supervise.
- D6 Wardens have been busy with public outreach events such as Rack Madness, Backwoods Show, and career days at high schools and colleges. This is the time of

- year that we receive lots of requests for outreach events. We will continue to fulfill these requests throughout the spring.
- Wardens continue to have issues with trespass complaints. This time of year, the complaints typically stem from hog hunters that are pursuing hogs at night with dogs.
- Fishing is starting to pick up around the district. Trout fishing continues to be steady in the 2 designated trout areas that we have in D6.

The animals were relocated to licensed rehabilitators in Medicine Park and the person that had them paid an administrative fine for possessing wildlife without a rehabilitators license.

#### Dist. 7 - Capt. Jeff Headrick

- Dylan worked Gage Beach and Lake Vincent and little activity. He took a SWOSU COPS program student on a ride along and came south to find some activity. They were able to cite 2 At EC LAKE for no license. He checked individuals at Shattuck selling furs. Dylan said the ride along was timid. He said he told her she would need to become more comfortable speaking to people if she wanted to become a GW.
- Andrew worked Canton with FTO Blackburn last week and they worked south finding better activity in Washita Co, writing 1 citation. He says canton hasn't picked up with activity yet. He received complaint of illegal night road hunting activity near the oakwood bridge. Landowner chased a newer Ford pickup to no avail. He returned the Axon BWC to HQ without actually getting to test it due to not receiving a new card for memory storage.
- Clint worked on getting a good pattern of movement, location, and times for the doe at Foss lake estates that has the mercury vapor light housing around her neck so wildlife division can tranquilize her this week and remove it. He received a call about possible trespassing, but the suspect ended up being landowner's family. He and I worked together Sunday checking Foss, EC, and Clinton Lakes. Checked 25 and wrote 4 for no licenses. One a repeat customer 5 times over. Investigated the great retrop mountain lion sighting, finding a 10 lb bobcat kitten.
- Tucker spent time FTOing Andrew and worked canton and south into Beckham and Washita to find good activity. He's been assisting USFS with pig trapping due to the biologists for USFS not being able to carry firearms. He assisted me when I was unable to respond due to being in POV with my kids in EC on my day off. A landowner near mayfield reported possible illegal night hunting/shooting from road and followed the tag less vehicle to a residence. BKSO #6 assisted and he and Tucker determined the unregistered vehicle was backfiring and no guns were possessed by the unlicensed driver who was a convicted felon.
- I worked on GWOY paperwork, prepared for Sayre Career day. Worked with Clint and we wrote 4 on Sunday. Investigated the retrop mt lion and then the Rocky mt lion... bobcat tracks found where the RP reported the injured lion in Rocky and a bobcat kitten seen where Retrop lion was reported. Dale Kennemer advised we'd have more luck catching poachers in the Retrop area instead of seeing a lion! Saturday weather was miserable but Sunday was great! Lots of folks out but catching of fish was very slow.
- Wardens tagged bobcats, assisted OHP and Fire departments with evacuations during a wildfire.

- Transitioning from hunters mode to fishing mode. Checking licenses at area lakes and farm ponds.
- Still doing a few night patrols for thermal activity. Investigated a possible elk poaching east of Cooperton. Not much to go on there.
- Pretty much all D7 Wardens assisted with wildfires after finishing up our CLEET training on last Friday the 14th.

#### Dist. 8 - Capt. Ben Bickerstaff

- Wardens B. Cottrill, Reigh, Grace, Badley, Pearson, Lt. Paul, & Capt. Bickerstaff all participated in the 2nd annual Deer scoring event at the Autry Vo-Tech center in Enid. The event was organized by Wardens B. Cottrill and Reigh. Although we scored many less deer than the initial event last year, it was still a great success. An estimated 40 deer were scored on a Wednesday evening from 5pm-9pm. Several questions were answered, stories heard, and even some furbearers were tagged. It was a great public outreach showcasing the versatilities and professionalism of Oklahoma Game Wardens.
- Several officers are following up on deer cases where the license was bought after the fact. It seems to be a trend this year with non-resident deer hunters.
- Several officers are preparing for the fishing season and planning multiple fishing clinics in their own areas.
- Lt. Baker has been involved in a possible poisoning case in Texas county where a
  resident placed Tomcat laced wheat seed top side of a prairie dog town right beside
  the city's sewer lagoon. The lagoon roosted several thousand light geese and ducks.
  Needless to say there were a lot of dead waterfowl. Lt. Baker enlisted the help of
  some D7 guys (Wardens Jones and Vaughn), TFO officer Long, and Capt. Bickerstaff
  to assist with evidence collection and furthering the investigation. Results are
  pending.
- Lt. Baker also worked an illegal waterfowl baiting investigation in Texas county with the assistance of Warden Badley.
- Lt. Paul lent his new show piece air boat the Tulsa boat show. This is good to promote the foundation and let folks know that their donations go back to Game Wardens.
- Warden P. Cottrill is working an investigation where an oil companies water pit lined with plastic are unintentionally trapping all kinds of wildlife and drowning them in Major County.
